Welcome

Welcome to this Sunday's edition of Cutting Edge Camelot.

Scripture Passage

Matthew 14.22-33

Immediately he made the disciples get into the boat and go on ahead to the other side, while he dismissed the crowds. And after he had dismissed the crowds, he went up the mountain by himself to pray. When evening came, he was there alone, but by this time the boat, battered by the waves, was far from the land, for the wind was against them. And early in the morning he came walking toward them on the sea. But when the disciples saw him walking on the sea, they were terrified, saying, "It is a ghost!" And they cried out in fear. But immediately Jesus spoke to them and said, "Take heart, it is I; do not be afraid."

Peter answered him, "Lord, if it is you, command me to come to you on the water." He said, "Come." So Peter got out of the boat, started walking on the water, and came toward Jesus. But when he noticed the strong wind, he became frightened, and beginning to sink, he cried out, "Lord, save me!" Jesus immediately reached out his hand and caught him, saying to him, "You of little faith, why did you doubt?" When they got into the boat, the wind ceased. And those in the boat worshiped him, saying, "Truly you are the Son of God."

Reflection

Our Bible passage from Matthew begins with the word 'immediately' because the events come straight after the feeding of the five thousand. Jesus sends the disciples off across the lake, while he takes some time out to pray. But as evening comes, the conditions on the lake deteriorate; the boat is being battered by wind and waves. The disciples – many of them fisherman – were scared: it must have been an unusually bad storm. Jesus' appearance walking on the water does little to reassure them, in fact it makes them even more terrified! But Jesus calls out to them: "Take heart, it is I; do not be afraid". And Peter, who is often a little impulsive, replies, "Lord, if it is you,



command me to come to you on the water".

Jesus commands Peter to come, and he does, and for a few moments he too is walking on the water with Jesus.

But then the reality of

his situation hits him – the strong wind, the large waves – and he begins to sink. Peter calls out, and immediately Jesus is there, holding him tight and rescuing him. Jesus asks him, "You of little faith, why did you doubt?", and as they get into the boat the wind ceases. After the roaring wind and waves, you can imagine the sudden calm and quiet, and the awe that came over the disciples as they worshipped Jesus and proclaimed, "Truly you are the Son of God".

What an extraordinary event to have witnessed! And the fact that we have a record of the event shows what an impact it had on those who were there. But what might it mean for us today?

I think it has a lot to teach us about **faith**.

First, it is a reminder that the life of faith, the life of being a Christian, is not all plain sailing! Just as the disciples battled with the waves, far from land, and with the wind against them, sometimes we find ourselves battered by the waves of life, feeling as if we are far from safety and security, and as if everything is against us. I wonder how many of us have felt that during these last few months? However, this passage is a reminder that Jesus comes towards us and meets us in these times. Despite the fact that the disciples were fishermen, and therefore may well have had the experience and knowledge to cope with the storm, Jesus comes to them in their distress. And when we face the inevitable storms of life, Jesus comes to us too.

The second thing we learn about faith in this passage is that the life of faith is rarely free from doubt. Again and again throughout the Bible, we see that even those who seem to have the deepest faith have moments of doubt. Even as Peter sees Jesus walking on the water he says, "Lord, IF it is you..."; I wonder if you've found yourself thinking or praying, "Lord, IF you really want me to do X, please do Y", or "IF this message really is from you, then..." We want reassurance. After Peter has courageously stepped out of the boat, he notices the strong wind and begins to sink. He begins to doubt. This isn't to say that whenever we have moments of doubt we will literally begin to sink, but it is a reminder that when we take our eyes off Jesus and when we allow ourselves to become so overwhelmed by our fears and by our circumstances, we can feel as if we are sinking deeper and deeper into our doubts. And we need to remember that when we, like Peter, call out, "Lord, save me!", Jesus is already there, coming towards us and ready to stop us sinking into our doubts.

You may wish to offer up to God any doubts or fears that you are currently struggling with, safe in the knowledge that Jesus is with us, and that even when the storms of life come and when our doubts and fears threaten to engulf us, he does not leave us, he holds us tight.
