Welcome

Today's edition has a somewhat different format as we mark and remember the death of our Queen during this period of national mourning.

Following short comments on some scripture passages that we are using this Sunday I have drawn together some prayers and readings that seem appropriate for this time. You may wish to use some or all of these for the purposes of your own reflections and prayers.

Some Scripture Passages that we are using this Sunday

Psalm 121

I lift up my eyes to the hills – from where will my help come?

² My help comes from the LORD, who made heaven and earth.

³ He will not let your foot be moved; he who keeps you will not slumber.

⁴ He who keeps Israel will neither slumber nor sleep.

⁵ The LORD is your keeper; the LORD is your shade at your right hand.

⁶ The sun shall not strike you by day, nor the moon by night.

⁷ The LORD will keep you from all evil; he will keep your life.

⁸ The LORD will keep your going out and your coming in from this time on and forevermore.

John 6: 35-40

Jesus said to them, "I am the bread of life. Whoever comes to me will never be hungry, and whoever believes in me will never be thirsty. ³⁶ But I said to you that you have seen me and yet do not believe. ³⁷ Everything that the Father gives me will come to me, and anyone who comes to me I will never drive away; ³⁸ for I have come down from heaven, not to do my own will, but the will of him who sent me. ³⁹ And this is the will of him who sent me, that I should lose nothing of all that he has given me, but raise it up on the last day. ⁴⁰ This is indeed the will of my Father, that all who see the Son and believe in him may have eternal life; and I will raise them up on the last day."

Psalm 121 is one of the psalms sung by pilgrims as they journeyed towards the Temple in Jerusalem in Old Testament times. As they did so they looked to the hills as an encouragement to seek God's help and protection in times of need.

What does death mean? Many of us will find that the Queen's death brings back to our minds our own past losses and bereavements. In this context the promise of eternal life proclaimed in John's gospel is a timely one. All that we need to do is to come to Christ and, as we do so, we are assured that we will never be driven away. For we are promised that all who believe in Christ will have eternal life and share in Christ's resurrection.
